From Mrs Kellow, Assistant Headteacher - Information on the Assessment process

Assessment helps students and staff keep informed in terms of progress and achievement. It is a vital tool in helping students manage their learning and staff ensuring the most effective teaching. Assessments are structured into three distinct learning cycles.

Each cycle will consist of:

- 1. Sharing the Learning Cycle knowledge with students so they are clear on what they will be learning
- 2. Teaching high quality lessons where students learn and retain key ideas and knowledge
- 3. A formal assessment fortnight
- 4. Opportunities for students to reflect and improve their work

The cycles will give all students clarity on when their assessments are, and precisely what knowledge or skills they will be assessed on. Your child will have been issued with a folder, which contains a Home Learning exercise book and a Learning Cycle Knowledge Booklet. All students will receive a new booklet at the beginning of each learning cycle. Each booklet contains Personal Learning Checklists (PLC's) for each subject, identifying the key ideas that will be assessed, along with comprehensive knowledge organisers. Students are expected to have their folders with them every lesson every day. If they lose their booklet a copy can be downloaded from the school website (https://www.poltairschool.co.uk/sort) or copies can be purchased at a cost of £1.50 from our online shop via ParentPay.

SORT Revision Strategy

At Poltair we celebrate a culture of effective study where students are prepared with essential learning skills enabling them to achieve success in all aspects of their educational journey. At Poltair we embrace a whole school revision strategy which supports every student to be able to recall the key ideas and knowledge they need to succeed.

There are four stages to the SORT revision strategy:

Students are taught how to use each SORT strategy, discovering which strategy works best for their learning style. There are resources for each strategy on the student shared area of our website for students and parents to access at any time.

Home Learning

Students are set Home Learning activities weekly using the ClassCharts platform. Home Learning activities include a SORT activity and an online quiz. Students will be expected to use their Home Learning exercise books to record their written responses and teachers may ask to see their workings in lessons. There is a suggested timetable in their Learning Cycle Knowledge Booklet for them to follow to ensure all Home Learning is completed on time.

How can parents/carers support?

- Help provide your child with a suitable place for them to complete their Home Learning
- Support your child in creating and following a Home Learning and SORT revision timetable so all work set is completed to the best of their ability
- Support your child with their Home Learning activities, especially help quiz them on the recall of key ideas and knowledge
- Encourage your child to complete independent revision by using the PLCs (Personal Learning Checklists) to identify priority topics and SORT to summarise, recall and test their understanding
- KS3 parents/carers, listen to your child read and ensure reading logs are signed
- Communicate with your child's tutor if you have any questions or concerns



From Mrs Spurgeon, Assistant Headteacher – Information on School Attendance

At Poltair School, we understand the importance of student attendance and we want to ensure that, as parents and carers, you fully understand the importance also. Good school attendance is classed as 96% and above.

Did you know that if a child has 90% attendance during their school career, this is equivalent to them missing over a full year of school? Also, a child with attendance of 90% or below, is twice as likely to drop one grade in GCSE examinations in Year 11 compared to a child with above 96%? These two facts should be the main incentive for any child to attend school daily but, in addition to this, we will reward students with good and improved attendance each term.

I would also like to take the opportunity to highlight how you should report school absence and the protocol regarding punctuality.

• If your child is going to be absent for any reason, please ensure that you make the school aware before 8.00am on each day of absence. This can either be done via telephone by leaving a message on the dedicated student absence mailbox (option 1 on the telephone system) or email the Attendance and Engagement Officer via <u>attendance@poltair.cornwall.sch.uk</u>. Please ensure you give clear information including your child's name, tutor group and the reason for the absence. If we are not provided with a reason, the absence will be recorded on their attendance record as unauthorised. Additionally, please be aware that you may be asked, at any time, to provide medical evidence regarding absences due to illness.

• If your child arrives at school less than 15 minutes late, their attendance will be recorded as 'L' on our records. This coding will not have a negative impact on their overall attendance figure; however, a sanction will be issued in line with our Behaviour Policy.

• If your child arrives more than 15 minutes late, this will be coded as 'U.' This coding will have a negative effect on their attendance and again a sanction will be issued in line with our policy. Further information regarding our expectations for student attendance can also be found in our Attendance Policy which is available on our website.

Please do not hesitate to contact me should you have any questions and if you need any additional support or there are barriers with your child attending school, please contact the Attendance and Engagement Officer or our Pastoral team. The Pastoral team for each year group is detailed below:

From Miss Waters, Assistant Headteacher – Inclusion and SEND

We are delighted to be working with you and your child at Poltair School and we would like to take this opportunity to welcome parents and carers to the Inclusion Team. This section outlines how we support students with Special Educational Needs & Disabilities (SEND). At Poltair, we aspire for every student, regardless of academic or physical ability or challenge to leave the school empowered with a good set of qualifications and a strong sense of self so they have the skills to be successful in life.

First and foremost, we believe in Quality First Teaching and Quality First Pastoral Care. The term 'quality first' is taken from the SEND Code of Practice and means delivering the highest standards of teaching and pastoral care for all students, particularly those with identified SEND needs. It is vital that students receive high-quality teaching in the classroom, together with appropriate support for identified students. It is also vital that the pastoral team provide high-quality support for students with identified SEND needs. These teams all work together to support the overall progress of students.

The Inclusion team at Poltair School identifies students' SEND needs and communicates this to staff, so that they can make learning accessible for all. The Inclusion team directly supports students with significant and persistent SEND needs, through additional specialist intervention, as appropriate. This is planned and reviewed regularly by our team, comprised of specialist members of staff.

Students with identified Special Educational Needs & Disabilities will:

- Be set suitable learning challenges with access to a broad and balanced curriculum
- Be supported appropriately to manage behaviour and effort

• Be supported by all staff, who will respond to students' diverse needs and help students overcome potential barriers to learning and behaviour

• Be given help and guidance to prepare for adulthood, including independence and life skills

Welcome to Poltair School Library!

From J.K Rowling to George Orwell, the recently refurbished school library is stocked with over 8,000 books for students and staff to borrow. A recent investment of £11,000 on new books alone, means that there is now more choice than ever! Students can take their pick from fact, fiction, graphic novels, poetry or quick reads for those who want a shorter text.

In addition to being able to visit the library during break and lunchtimes and after school, students can use our easy online booking system to both browse our 'virtual' shelves as well as borrow the books they would like to read.


How can my child borrow books?

Accessit Library is our online platform that enable students to access and search our catalogue of books. Students can log into Accessit Library from school or home, anywhere they have access to a computer, tablet, or phone.

Logging in is simple: the details are the same ones that students use to log in to the school system. They can also access the platform from the student home page on the school network, using the icon opposite.








This will take students to their own personal page, (shown opposite) where they can search, catalogue, reserve, book and renew books:

A green circle on any book will indicate how many copies are available, and a red circle indicates that it's not currently available for loan. However, it can be reserved and then students are notified when the book is available for lending:

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How long can students borrow books for?

Students can borrow books for up to two weeks at a time, they can also extend their lend, either in person or again via the ACCESSIT platform. Students need to click on their name and the tab underneath it that says 'My Borrowing Details'.



They will see what books they have taken out already, which ones they have on their reserve list and details of when the books are due back.

As with any other lending library, there is no cost for students to borrow and read books from the library. However, students are responsible for keeping track of and returning borrowed books. If the book ends up damaged or lost, students will be responsible for either replacing or paying for the book.

How can I encourage my child to read at home?

Please encourage your child to take out a book and read for both pleasure and progress. Talk to them about what they are reading or log in to the platform with them and look for books together.

Reading is possibly the single-most important activity your child can do to improve achievement in school.



Research has shown that reading helps cognitive development; students who read at home do 'significantly better' <u>across the curriculum</u> (including 9.9% better in maths) than students who don't read. Linked to this is the fact that reading is the best way to improve vocabulary, essential for success in every subject. Reading also has social and emotional benefits. It increases self-esteem and studies show that students who read are more empathetic. Growing up is tough -- reading can help young people explore complex problems from the safe fictional world of a book. Our pledge as a school, is to ensure that we put reading at the heart of what we do – your support with this is hugely appreciated!
